



a) stories that are local and national - they must show a systemic problem and also have an impact locally

b) provide data or other evidence that can be sliced across the country

c) are best done with a community or network

Build evidence at scale.

<u>Collaborate across industry,</u> <u>knowledge and experience</u>

a) those affected by the issue b) those with knowledge on the issue c) those that can change the issue and d) those who want to report with us or contribute knowledge or a skill.

Collaborators must agree to:

- a) the embargo date set out by the Bureau Local
- b) credit the Bureau Local in their work
- c) share their findings with other collaborators
- d) adhere to our data/evidence guidance

Reporting recipes give:

- a) context behind the investigation
- b) a guide to understanding the data/evidence
- c) our key findings
- d) questions and leads to follow locally
- e) other resources of use.






