

Frontex invitations to Industry Days

- 5. All presentations by any other speaker be it industry representative, academic, Member State representative, or attendee of any kind shown during the course of these meetings/workshops/events/gatherings/...;
- 6. All reports, summaries, minutes, notes, or record-keeping of any kind produce by Frontex as an outcome of these meetings/workshops/events/gatherings/...

The Frontex obstacle course

1. Delay

"Before we are able to process your application, we have to inform you that it is very wide and pertains to a significant number of documents. We would thus invite you to develop, similar to previous cases, a fair solution in order to reconcile your needs with those of good administration."

What to do

Break down the request (per meeting, per type of document...)

Prioritise according to what you'd like to receive first.



2. Ask for money

"We would like to inform you that the possible redaction required from Frontex under Article 4 of Regulation (EC) 1049/2001 and the hard copies that are going to be produced in its course, oblige us to charge 20 cent per page plus postage."

What to do

Refuse to give them money.



3. Delay (more)

What to do

10-day silence

Insist.



4. Delay (more, again)

What to do

"In order to determine the scope and find a commonly acceptable solution, would you be available on Thursday, 6 February to receive our call between 1530 and 1600?" Talk to them.



Request first filed: 9 January 2020 Frontex starts processing the request: 6 February 2020

5. Refuse

"some limited parts of the documents fall under exceptions under Article 4 of Regulation (EC) No 1049/2001 and therefore had to be expunged"

What to do

Appeal the refusal.



6. Forbid

What to do

"Kindly be reminded that the copyright of the document/s rests with Frontex and making this/these work/s, available to third parties in this or another form without prior authorisation of Frontex is prohibited."

Ignore the claim.

The massive expansion of the budget, personnel, and powers of the EU's border agency Frontex has also seen increasingly privileged access for industry. This perpetuates a vision of border control based on more and more firearms and biometric surveillance that has major human rights implications.

The massive expansion of EU border agency Frontex in recent years has not been matched by a corresponding increase in transparency, accountability, nor scrutiny.

Access to document requests reveal a disturbing trend by which arms, surveillance, and biometrics companies are being given an outsized role - unmatched by other voices - in



How it started

We reached out to Frontex with questions regarding the discrepancy between what it told the European Parliament and its approach to handling lobbying. We were told by Frontex's press office that:

'Frontex does not meet with lobbyists. Given our mandate (contribute to the implementation of integrated border management at the external borders of the EU) and the fact that the agency does not play a role in the EU decision-/law-making process, Frontex does not attract the interest of lobbyists."

How its going

Frontex and lobbying: Executive Director Decision on the **Transparency Register**







06 May 2021



Frontex is to set up a lobbying transparency register to record details of meetings with representatives from the private sector, in accordance with the 2019 Regulation governing the border agency. Statewatch has obtained the Decision of Executive Director establishing the register.
